


Western Diamond-backed Rattlesnake

Crotalus atrox (CRAT)



Habitat Survey Removals and random yards




Snake removals occur in cluttered yards that provide low cover.

Nonvenomous, colubrid snakes are found at higher urbanization levels than venomous, viperid snakes.
