Joan's plans for her future are sweet and simple; she wants to spend time with her family, read, and enjoy the beauty of nature. In her spare time, Joan enjoys gardening, playing the piano, and of course, staying in contact with all of those who cheered her on during her time at ASU. Joan will proudly complete her BLS degree in August and will join the graduating class of Summer 2013. Fun Fact: Jamie is an amateur photographer.


